Jeff has had some amazing success with using a semi hydroponics method to grow some orchids, especially *Laelias*. When you see how these plants are growing, you might want to try your hand at semihydroponics. It uses LECA, a lightweight expanded clay aggegrate that wicks a nutrient solution to the orchids roots. https://youtu.be/TBTgwtbZaFU

DISCOUNT ON ORCHIDS BUT YOU NEED TO ACT FAST.

Ecuagenera Orchid Nursery in Ecuador is currently having a 5% discount on plant orders but the discount is only for plants ordered by June 7, 2020. You can download the price list for their orchids, flasks and tropical plants at https://www.ecuagenera.com/epages/ecuagenera.sf/en_US/?ObjectPath=/Shops/e cuagenera/Categories/%22Price%20List%22. You can see photos of most of the orchid flowers or plants of most of them by going to their website (https://www.ecuagenera.com/) and clicking on their 'Orchid Species' tab and then picking the genera you are interested in seeing. A number of the FCOS members have purchased orchids from Ecuagenera and have found their quality to be very good. Eric and Christina Holenda and Chris and his wife Betsy have visited the Ecuagnera nurseries in Ecuador and were amazed at the large size of the operation and of the number of species they were growing.

Ecuagenera will add \$2 per plant to cover their cost of CITIES paperwork and shipping to Florida. You will also pay for the cost of Priority Mail shipping from Florida to your house. If you are interested in ordering plants with the discount please call Chris (805-748-4609) by June 5 at the latest and email him your order and he will help to coordinate the plants to be a single order so they can be shipped from Florida in the fewest boxes possible. That will help save money on shipping from Florida. If you want to place an order directly please add in the following code 9BWPNP4V for the discount and make sure you order before the discount deadline ends.



Original orchid color plates abound in this distinctive Orchid Encyclopedia by Peggy Alrich and Wes Higgins, a marvelous and artistic creation in landscape format of 500 pages.

Original orchid discoverer and date are listed as well as the Etymology and Generitype of more than 2000 orchids along with a easy to read description of growth habits, countries and regions within countries of origin. The plants and flowers are aptly discussed and the authors give colors and varieties found in various areas of note. Sepals and petals along with special features of lips complete the beautifully described notes. Of note in the book are the synonyms the orchids have had over the years, and those that were, and are, invalid even today. A modern twist to the encyclopedia features a general culture description which helps even a veteran grower understand the some of the nuances of the particular plants being discussed. What is absolutely beautiful is the collection of artwork of each of the plants done in color plates, many by the original artist or from an original collection and dated. Many of the drawings illustrate entire flowers, with all their separated parts. This book would be a welcome and beautiful addition to any orchid grower's collection, a stunning work and artistic treasure.

The book is 600 pages long, hardbound, and 8 1/2 x 11 in landscape format.

Sarcochilus hartmanii expertly grown outside by Chris Ehrler.



All the Kirra Lea are from the same seed pod that Dan Asbell produced and then he also did the flasking work with the seed pod once it was ready to go.



Dendrobium Galton Sunday grown by Judy Scheithauer



Cochleanthes discolor grown by Ed Lysek. Bright shade and moist in summer, less water in winter. This plant is from Ecuagenera - see Chris Ehrler's message at the beginning of this newsletter if you wish to purchase a similar plant from Ecuagenera.



Dendrobium chrysotoxum - requires a dry rest from Thanksgiving to Valentine's Day. Grown by Ed Lysek and withstands cool dry winter temperatures in the low 40s and appreciates plenty of water and fertilizer in summer. Grown mounted on an oak branch.



Looks like asparagus? I counted 7 new growths from the base of this plant, growing in large (black) lava rock.

It's *Dendrobium delicatum* (D. *speciosum X D. kingianum*). This plant has been growing outside in Templeton for the last 12 months, under a polycarbonate protected walkway. Temperatures were in the high 20s for several nights this winter and summer highs were in the low 100s. It bloomed in March! One tough plant. -Ed Lysek

Catasetum tigrinum x *kleberianum*, from SVO. REALLY early bloom, most bloom in the Fall. Another great plant from Eric H.




