

Our February speaker, Bob Asbell did an amazing job teaching us how to grow cymbidium orchids.



Bob Asbell who owns Asbell Orchids was the guest speaker at FCOS's February meeting. He started by speekign about the history of orchids in California with an emphasis on Cymbidiums which he has been hybridizing for many years. Cymbidiums used to be grown as cut flowers with the flowers being mainly used to make corsages. White was the only color that florists wanted. But Bob and many other grows prefer to grow Cymbidiums with a variety of colors, although after 40 years of hybridizing he said there are few very good yellow Cymbidiums. Hybridizers are working to get wider sepals and petals. Diploid Cymbidiums have 40 chromosomes while tetraploids have 80 and triploids have a chromosome count of 60. Bob mentioned there are six elements that distinguish orchids from other plants. Orchids have three sepals, two petals and one lip. Along the central coast of California Cymbidiums will grow very well outside. At Bob's nursery and lab, once the seeds have germinated and become large enough, they replate a total of 40 small orchids into each sterile flask. Once they are large enough they are then transplanted into rows in small bark. At that point they are placed in a warm room until they become established. When they get larger they are then placed into individual pots. They water their *Cymbidiums* two times/week with overhead watering. They water long enough for water to come out the bottom of the pot. In reference to temperature they have seen that Cymbidium flowers will freeze when exposed to 23-27 °F while the back bulbs can make it to about 15 °F. He said there is much debate about fertilizer type and application rate. They use a mixture of 20-20-20 with trace elements. They apply fertilizer year round but alter the concentration during the year. From Jan-June they use very low

concentrations. They have found that higher concentrations during this period will cause the *Cymbidium* to grow more and bloom less. Bob also stated that it takes about 7-8 years from seed production to first blooming in *Cymbidiums*.

My *Tillandsia* - fat and happy, dilute fertilizer every week, regular water and bright filtered sunlight. Happy but dull green all year long.

And if you have a few air plants that just don't seem to develop much color, below is some advice.



WOW! Brian Kollenborn of Air Plant Alchemy, Carpinertia's *Tillandsia bulbosa*.

Brian's secret to highly pigmented *Tillandsias*: Do not fertilize for 3 months or more, increase light levels and reduce watering. This stresses the plant and produces intense coloration.
